2. Voters Aren't Seeing the Recovery

Despite mostly <u>positive news</u>, voters aren't seeing the effects of the economic recovery. More than half (54%) say it's become much or somewhat harder in the last six months for them to pay for basic necessities. Comparatively, just one in 10 (11%) say affording the basics has eased much or somewhat. A third, (35%) report their budgets holding steady.
