

## Biden leads Trump bypointsin the Granite State

Former Vice President Joe Biden has probat lead over President Donald Trump in the contest for New Hampshire's 4 Electoral Votes in a new swing state place Hampshire likely voters released by the UMass Lowell Center for Ruopinion. ## New Hampshire vote parefer that the President wait on nominating Ginsbaugisessor

Respondents were also askedhether the next Supreme Court justicethe replacement for JusticeRuth Bader Ginsburgshould be appointed by the current President or by the winner of the 2020 Presidential election. Here, we see a large majority, 58%, of New Hampshire likely voters say that the winner of the Presidential election should appoint Jessionsburg's successor to the high court, while only 42% say that the sitting President should appeinsuccessor.

This appears to be protentially damagin issue for President Trump and Republicans. Democrats are unified -97% say the winner of the 2020 election should appoint Ginsburg's uccessor. Likewise, 59% of Independents agree that it should be the winner of the 2020 election and not the sitting President. Finally, nearly 1 in five Republicans (18%) dissent from the party stance here and believe that the winner of the election should appoint Ginsburg is cessor. When we look at the data by gender, 64% of women believe that Ginsburg's successor should be appointed by the 2020 winner, while only 36% believe it should be the sitting the President evenly, with 51% saying the 2020 winns appoint appoint appoint appoint.
