In 2016, Senator Bernie Sanders, the Independent from Vermont, won the New Hampshire primary by 22 points over his rival Hillary Clinton. With just eight days tong! the 2020 first in-the-nation Granite State primary anders still on top garnering the support of 23% of New Hampshire Democratic primary likely voters, in a new poll conducted by the UMass Lowell Center for Public Opinion. Mayor Pete Buttigieg trails the top three candidates as the only other candidate polling in double digits at 12%. He is followed bijlionaire activist Tom Steyer (6%), Senator Amy Klobuchar (6%), and Congresswoman Tulsi Gabbard (5%). No other candidate is polling above 5% while 4% of likely voters say they are still undecided.
